From the Principal

FOUNDER'S DAY – 15 MAY

In Lasallian schools and universities all around the world, 15 May is marked as Founder's Day. It commemorates the Feast Day of St John Baptist de La Salle, the patron saint of teachers and also the founder of the De La Salle Brothers. Our College was founded by the Brothers in 1954 and they remained at De La Salle, Midland (as the school was then known) until 1971. While the Brothers no longer have a direct presence in our school, the charisma and spirit of St John Baptist continues to pervade all of our undertakings.

John Baptist de La Salle was born in Rheims, France on 30 April, 1651. He went on to establish a teaching order of Brothers who were committed to "*touching hearts*" and "*caring for the least, the lost and the last.*" The following quote from a Memoir written in Rouen in 1721 expresses succinctly what John Baptist de La Salle had achieved between 1679 and 1719.

"Monsieur de La Salle had the idea of setting up [free] schools where the children of workmen and the poor would learn reading, writing and arithmetic, and would also receive a Christian education through catechisms and other forms of instruction appropriate for forming good Christians. For this purpose he brought together a group of young unmarried men. He strove to have them live in a way which was consistent with the end of their Institute, and in order to renew the life of the first Christians . . . he composed Rules for them."

Today the Brothers work in over eighty five countries and minister, together with over 65,000 lay colleagues, to more than 1,000,000 students. It is extraordinary to think that this one man, inspired by his love and commitment to Christ, was able to light a flame which continues to have an impact on the lives of so many people almost 300 years after his death. At La Salle, along with other Lasallian schools around Australia, Founder's Week is almost always celebrated with Mission Aid [or Action] Day (MAD). This is an occasion when the whole school community comes together to commemorate our Lasallian heritage. However, in keeping with St John Baptist de La Salle's vision, it is also a day of action, directed towards supporting those who are less fortunate. At La Salle, our PCGs have been preparing for several months to devise ways in which to raise funds for charitable works. I will provide a report in next week's Delagram on the various activities which took place and the funds raised.

A final reminder that our inaugural meeting of the Friends of La Salle will be held on Monday evening, 21 May, commencing at 7:00pm. Hopefully, the gathering will only take about one hour and then there will be an opportunity to enjoy a little Swan Valley wine and cheese. We certainly don't want to make involvement in this group an onerous task, with meetings only scheduled for once per term. However, our College has been enriched over the past fifty three years by the wonderful support of its parents. We hope that the Friends of La Salle will be a vehicle for our parents to be further involved in the development of community at the College.

SUNDAY REFLECTION

The Feast of the Ascension of the Lord (Gospel: Luke 24:46-53)

Jesus' departure and ascension into heaven was both an end and a beginning for his disciples. While it was the end of Jesus' physical presence with his beloved disciples, it marked the beginning of Jesus' presence with them in a new way. Jesus promised that he would be with them always, to the end of time. He assured them of his power - a power which overcame sin and death. Now as the glorified and risen Lord and Saviour, ascended to the right hand of the Father in heaven, Jesus promised to give them the power of his Holy Spirit, which we see fulfilled ten days later on the Feast of Pentecost (Luke 24:49 and Acts 2:1-4). When the Lord Jesus departed physically from the apostles, they were not left alone or powerless. Jesus assured them of his presence and the power of the Holy Spirit.

Jesus' last words to his apostles point to his saving mission and to their mission to be witnesses of his saving death and his glorious resurrection and to proclaim the good news of salvation to all the world. Their task is to proclaim the good news of salvation, not only to the people of Israel, but to all the nations. God's love and gift of salvation is not just for a few, or for a nation, but it is for the whole world -- for all who will accept it. The gospel is the power of God, the power to forgive sins, to heal, to deliver from evil and oppression, and to restore life. Do you believe in the power of the gospel?

This is the great commission which the risen Christ gives to the whole church. All believers have been given a share in this task - to be heralds of the good news and ambassadors for Jesus Christ, the only Saviour of the world. We are not to sit around staring at the sky.

We are not to keep the mystery of Christ secret. Rather, we are to proclaim Christ, not just in what we say, but primarily in how we live. So many people long to understand the reason for their existence. So many people are seeking meaning for their lives. The Christian is called to provide this meaning. We are called to live the presence of the Lord upon earth. The Lord has ascended into heaven, yet he is still here, right here, among his people. We are his witnesses. Do you witness to others the joy of the gospel and the hope of the resurrection?

Some thoughts: As believers we are invited to extend our arms in embracing all creation as holy and our hands to receive God's love for us and share it. We walk in the Garden with its weeds, the mess with its dirt and we bring it all inside us to the Eucharistic embrace which is always celebrated there.

We, as with the Apostles, turn our eyes from heaven and return to our personal Jerusalems and our private temples so to be inspired by the Holy Spirit that we might pull some weeds, clean some messes within ourselves and assist the divine clean-up begun by the loved apostles.

Prayer: "Lord Jesus, through the gift of your Holy Spirit, you fill us with an indomitable spirit of praise and joy which no earthly trial can subdue. Fill me with your resurrection joy and help me to live a life of praise and thanksgiving for your glory. May I witness to those around me the joy of the gospel and the reality of your resurrection."

SCABIES

Scabies is an infestation of the skin of a microscopic mite. Recently a student has presented with Scabies. Health Department protocol suggests that an infected student remain at home until cleared of the infestation. The College has implemented this protocol. The signs and symptoms of infestation are pimple-like irritations, burrows or rash of the skin. Scabies is passed on by direct, prolonged, skin-to-skin contact with a person already infested with scabies. Contact must be prolonged. Infestation may also occur by sharing clothing, towels, and bedding.

Once away from the human body, mites do not survive more than 48-72 hours. However when on a living person the mite can survive for up to a month. For a person who has never been infested with scabies, symptoms may take 4-6 weeks to begin. For a person who has had scabies, symptoms appear within several days. We encourage parents to visit their GP if they are concerned that they or a family member may be exhibiting any of these signs and symptoms.

NATIONAL SAFE SCHOOLS WEEK

National Safe Schools Week is celebrated nationwide from 24 May to 1 June. The National Safe Schools Week is an Australian Government initiative working with the States to promote caring, supporting and looking out for others within the school environment. The Australian Government is committed to ensuring that the safety and wellbeing of all members of the school community are protected. One of the aims of the NSSP is to: Raise community awareness of the importance of all members of a school community having the right to learn or teach in a safe and supportive environment, free from all forms of bullying, harassment, violence, abuse and neglect. As part of the NSSP week at La Salle College student leaders from each House will be conducting surveys within their PCAs.

The information from this survey will be used to help us improve what we do to make our college a caring and safe place to learn. Student leaders will also come and speak to the students at their House Assembly about how each one of them can show others that they do care if they notice someone else is having a hard time. Student leaders also presented this information about Cyber bullying to the college community at Assembly on Wednesday.

Cyber - bullying happens when students use their mobile phones, websites, blogs and chat rooms to bully others. Cyber-bullying includes:

- Insulting and ridiculing people in chat rooms (known as “flaming”)
- Posting malicious or private information about someone in blogs
- Posing as someone else in a chat room
- Putting photos of people on the web accompanied by negative or derogatory comments
- Using the web, chat rooms or mobile phones to spread malicious rumours or information.
- Sending cruel or threatening messages
- Tricking someone into sharing private or sensitive information and then sharing it online.

Online cruelty can be even more hurtful than other forms of bullying because the young person will often be alone when it occurs and may feel isolated and unable to speak about it.

Cyber-bullying happens because people have a sense of invisibility online. Some feel this gives them the right to be insulting and cruel and not having anyone know leaves them without guilt or a sense of responsibility for their actions. There is a common belief among young people that “what happens online, stays online”. This means that people engaging in cyber-bullying feel that they can get away with it. Young people are often reluctant to tell parents or teachers if they are cyber-bullied, often because they fear their computer or mobile phone use will be restricted. Many young people also believe adults are not able to stop cyber-bullying.

Here is what you can do if cyber-bullying occurs

Protect your number- only give it to friends and don't leave your mobile where others can access your number.

Block your number when calling people you don't know well or people you don't trust.

Know that anything you put on a computer or text message could become public knowledge.

If you do get a nasty message, don't respond.

People who bully like to upset people and being bullied is upsetting.

Keep the message or print out the chat page as a record of what has happened.

You can get help. Schools are serious about stopping cyber- bullying. The law is also on your side.

In many cases people engaging in cyber-bullying can be charged with defamation, invasion of privacy or inflicting emotional distress.

Malicious calls can be traced.

Mobile phone companies can also help you by preventing some numbers getting through to your phone or giving you a new number.

It is important that you know that **there are people here at school** that you can talk to if you are at the receiving end of any cyber-bullying. Your House or Year Coordinators or your PCAs are all people that you can talk to and they will help you to take any action that may be necessary. Parents are encouraged to speak with their children about their computer and phone usage and if they have any concern to contact the appropriate Year Coordinator.

Remember that the most important step to end any kind of bullying is to tell an adult what is happening. This is not dobbing, as everyone has the right to be safe whilst they learn.

WHAT IS A TRIPLE S, SCIENCE FOR SCHOOL STUDENT FAIR, AND WHO MAY ATTEND?

Triple S Science fairs are free! They are an exciting hands-on evening where students, (particularly middle school students) and their families, and the general public can come and find out about science and technology - to catch the enthusiasm, find out about careers, and find out about science in the community. This is an opportunity to find out about what scientists actually do, and talk in an informal setting. Fairs are supported by the five public universities, Scitech, STAWA, and Department of Education and Training. Stallholders come from these institutions and many others, including Ribbons of Blue, WA Museum, and Australian Society for Medical Research. Come and look through a microscope, investigate groundwater flow and contamination (and eat the model afterwards), check out health and fitness or do some chemistry. The fairs are NOT university course information evenings, but provide a window into the practicalities of different areas of science and technology. The aim is to encourage middle school students to embrace science and maths, so they continue to study them in Years 11 and 12, and so can consider careers involving science and technology.
