FROM THE PRINCIPAL

PARENT INFORMATION EVENING WITH JADE LEWIS

Your son or daughter may have told you of the very powerful presentation by Jade Lewis, a former drug addict. The Parent Education Group of The Friends of La Salle has decided to give parents the opportunity of listening to Jade. I would really encourage you to come along to the Auditorium on Tuesday, 18 September at 7:00 pm.

The misuse of drugs has become a scourge of modern day society. Sadly, parents can be sometimes ignorant to the pressures of being a teenager and the temptations that present themselves. Open and frank discussion, accompanied by sound education, are the most effective ways in which you as a parent can minimize the risks of your child becoming involved in this self destructive behaviour.

The exhibition continues in conjunction with "Spring in The Valley' festivities on Saturday and Sunday from 10:00am to 4:00pm.

UNIFORM AND GROOMING

From time to time the College needs to remind students and parents of the necessity to wear the College uniform correctly. While the overwhelming majority of our students always present in a most appropriate way, small numbers of students continually push the boundaries. When this occurs it is appropriate for the school to remind students of our expectations and to sanction those who deliberately fail to comply with our regulations.

Starting on Thursday we will be having a focussed 'blitz' on uniform. This will involve the issuing of uniform infringements to students who are not wearing the uniform correctly (including hair and make-up). The consequence for receiving an infringement will be a 20 minute lunchtime detention. Obviously, if a student fails to attend this lunchtime detention, the consequence will then escalate.

I ask all parents to discuss uniform requirements with their sons and daughters and to support the College in this strategy to ensure that ALL students are complying with College regulations.

FR ROMAN'S SPIRITUAL GUIDANCE

SUNDAY REFLECTION ON THE WORD OF GOD

GOSPEL SUMMARY - LUKE 15: 1-32

The Pharisees and Scribes are complaining that Jesus is a companion of tax collectors and sinners: "This man welcomes sinners and eats with them." Jesus responds to the criticism through three parables. In the first two parables, a shepherd finding a lost sheep, and a woman finding a lost coin, are compared to the joy of God upon finding a lost sinner. In the third parable, Jesus reveals that God is like a father who welcomes back a prodigal son who had left home and foolishly squandered his share of the estate. Furthermore, the father continues to love an older, resentful son who refuses to join in welcoming back his younger brother.

LIFE IMPLICATIONS

In the three parables of the gospel for this Sunday, Jesus reveals the joyful news that God loves us. There could be no deeper source of awareness of our worth than to trust Jesus and to believe that we human beings are truly precious in the eyes of God. Further life-implications may come to light if we imaginatively identify with the Pharisees and Scribes to whom the parables are addressed, and also with the two sons of the third parable.

We succumb to the self-righteous illusion of the Pharisees and scribes when we judge that some of our fellow human beings are excluded from God's love, and thereby may be excluded from our love. We become like the foolish younger son when we fall victim to the illusion that our happiness and freedom lie in autonomy from God. We become like the older son when we remain in our Father's house, but do not experience the joy of being at home. The older brother did not live as a child of a loving father, but as an employee who keeps track of what the boss owes to him and to other employees as well. In his resentment of unfair compensation, he can no longer recognize his brother as brother.

In Jesus' third parable, only the younger son comes to his senses and returns to his father, who, forgetting his own dignity, runs to welcome him home as a beloved child. If today we receive the grace to be freed from our own illusions, we can also come to identify with the attitude of Jesus and allow God's love to be present in the world through our actions. This is the most effective way of proclaiming to the world that God truly does love all of us as his own children.

Luke in his gospel repeatedly points out that Jesus sought to be in harmony with his Father's will through prayer. In this way he wants to teach us that only through prayer can we have confidence that we are acting in harmony with God's will in the particular circumstances of our lives. Also in prayer, we ask for the grace that will enable us to respond to new criticisms of God's ways with the insight and wit of Jesus.

Do you know the joy of repentance and the restoration of relationship as a son or daughter of your heavenly Father?

Prayer:

"Lord Jesus, may the light of your love and truth free me from the darkness of sin and unbelief. Let your light shine through me that others may see your love and truth and find hope and peace in you. May I never doubt your love nor take for granted the mercy you have shown to me. Fill me with your transforming love that I may be merciful as you are merciful."
