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WORLD YOUTH DAY

We found comfort in each other's company, often sharing our sense of disorientation, laughing at our mistakes and trying to translate from our native language to English, what we think, believe and feel. Often, our conversations looked like one of the episodes of: "Look who's talking"!

Collegiality soon became friendship - something which Fr Roman is an expert in. His happy, smiling face and frequent loud laughing made him one of the most approachable and popular staff members at the College. His genuine and honest way of expressing himself made us feel at ease. We all knew we could be ourselves with Roman!

When he broke the news that he was returning to Poland I felt sad. "One friend less!" I said to myself. And I guess I was not the only one who was saying that in his or her heart. The number of students, parents and especially staff, at his farewell mass, testifies how close Fr Roman was to the LaSallian community. Ms Lynsdale prepared a PowerPoint presentation on Fr Roman's time at the College. One thing was clear - Fr Roman was with the community not only during liturgical celebrations but in **all** the College events. Perhaps that is an important lesson we all can learn. If we want to succeed in our mission of evangelisation, we need to be with the people and for the people we are evangelising to. If we want to touch hearts, we have to be courageous enough to show our hearts to others - to be ourselves.

Thank you Fr Roman for all your support and constant work at the College. You have succeeded in revealing the true face of Christ; the one who walks with the people and is there for the people; the one who does not compromise the truth when discussing matters of faith; but the one who understands the hearts of people and is always ready to accept anyone with open arms. We will miss you!

Pope Benedict XVI to the youth on the 22nd World Youth Day in Sydney (Part 2)

My dear young friends

On the occasion of the 22nd World Youth Day that will be celebrated in the dioceses on Palm Sunday, I would like to propose for your meditation the words of Jesus: "*Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another*" (John 13:34).

Loving our neighbour as Christ loves us

Now we have arrived at the third stage of our reflection. Christ cried out from the Cross: "*I am thirsty*" (Jn 19:28). This shows us his burning thirst to love and to be loved by each one of us. It is only by coming to perceive the depth and intensity of such a mystery that we can realise the need and urgency to love him as He has loved us. This also entails the commitment to even give our lives, if necessary, for our brothers and sisters sustained by love for Him. God had already said in the Old Testament: "*You shall love your neighbour as yourself*" (Lev 19:18), but the innovation introduced by Christ is the fact that to love as he loves us means loving everyone without distinction, even our enemies, "*to the end*" (cf Jn 13:1).

Witnesses to the love of Christ

I would like to linger for a moment on three areas of daily life where you, my dear young friends, are particularly called to demonstrate the love of God. The first area is the Church, our spiritual family, made up of all the disciples of Christ. Mindful of his words: "*By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another*" (Jn 13:35), you should stimulate, with your enthusiasm and charity, the activities of the parishes, the communities, the ecclesial movements and the youth groups to which you belong. Be attentive in your concern for the welfare of others, faithful to the commitments you have made. Do not hesitate to joyfully abstain from some of your entertainments; cheerfully accept the necessary sacrifices; testify to your faithful love for Jesus by proclaiming his Gospel, especially among young people of your age.

Preparing for the future

The second area, where you are called to express your love and grow in it, is your preparation for the future that awaits you. If you are engaged to be married, God has a project of love for your future as a couple and as a family. Therefore, it is essential that you discover it with the help of the Church, free from the common prejudice that says that Christianity with its commandments and prohibitions places obstacles to the joy of love and impedes you from fully enjoying the happiness that a man and woman seek in their reciprocal love. The love of a man and woman is at the origin of the human family and the couple formed by a man and a woman has its foundation in God's original plan (cf Gen 2:18-25). Learning to love each other as a couple is a wonderful journey, yet it requires a demanding "apprenticeship". The period of engagement, very necessary in order to form a couple is a time of expectation and preparation that needs to be lived in purity of gesture and words. It allows you to mature in love, in concern and in attention for each other; it helps you to practice self-control and to develop your respect for each other. These are the characteristics of true love that does not place emphasis on seeking its own satisfaction or its own welfare. In your prayer together, ask the Lord to watch over and increase your love and to purify it of all selfishness. Do not hesitate to respond generously to the Lord's call, for Christian matrimony is truly and wholly a vocation in the Church. Likewise, dear young men and women, be ready to say "yes" if God should call you to follow the path of ministerial priesthood or the consecrated life. Your example will be one of encouragement for many of your peers who are seeking true happiness.

YEAR 10 DAEDALUS CLUB

BEHAVIOUR & DISCIPLINE PROCEDURE

As many parents are already aware, the College behaviour procedures were revised for the commencement of 2008. In a quick summary; if behaviour, homework completion, organisation or lateness to class become a concern, teachers may issue the student with a written warning on the orange page in the College Organiser. The 3-strike policy means that when students receive an accumulation of 3 entries, they are required to attend a lunchtime detention for 20 minutes. The teacher who issues the third warning will complete and hand the student a detention slip informing them that they are required to attend B1 within 5 minutes of the lunch siren. If a student fails to attend a lunch detention, they will receive a Tuesday after school detention for 1 hour. If there are legitimate reasons for not attending, students will be given an opportunity to "catch up" during a subsequent lunchtime. Immediate lunch detentions may also be issued for uniform infringements or more serious breaches of behaviour, while multiple or an accumulation of lunch detentions will result in more serious sanctions. You are encouraged to look at these pages in your son/daughter's Organiser.

This system has been implemented to ensure consequences for student actions are immediate and provided students learn from their actions and attend the detention issued, parents will not be inconvenienced by having to collect their child after school.

HEALTH PICNICS

Last week, Year 8 Health Education classes each held "Health Picnics". After studying Nutrition for 5 weeks, students put this knowledge into practice by selecting a suitable recipe to prepare at home and bring along to the class "Health Picnic". Students were encouraged to improve the nutritional value of recipes they found through their research by making a range of adjustments like changing white cereal products to wholemeal, increasing the fruit or vegetable content of their recipe or reducing the fat or sugar content. Students had to also use their ingenuity to work out a way to transport the prepared food to school and be suitable to share at the picnic.

Parents and staff members were invited to the picnics. Class teachers like Ms Heather Gooden questioned students about the food they had bought along and why they considered it to be a suitable recipe. Having 3 of these classes, Ms Gooden was unable to try all of the food but by all accounts it was delicious. The award for the most interesting recipe would have to be the "Watermelon Cake" prepared by Caitlin McCracken.

All of the students involved are to be commended for the effort put into this task, as are the parents who provided support by buying ingredients and advising students.



ONSITE & VET

During the second week of the Year 11 and 12 Semester 1 exam period, 32 Year 11 and 12 ONSITE students attended school each day from 8:30 am until 3:00 pm and participated in the Certificate 1 in Work Preparation VET course. The course complemented their work experience through the ONSITE programme and taught students about important workplace procedures and legislation in the areas of occupational safety and health, industrial relations and equal employment opportunity. They also developed skills and knowledge in workplace communication to include writing business letters, answering telephone calls, dealing with customer complaints and refining listening skills. The certificate would take 6 months to complete at a TAFE College and these students were given just the one week to cover all the necessary content. Whilst most students have yet to complete all of the assessment tasks in such a tight timeframe, I am hopeful these will be done before the end of term and students will be awarded the complete Certificate 1 in Work Preparation. They should be commended on their attendance and participation in the course and I hope they learnt from the experience.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

LITTLE LEMON TARTS

Ingredients Case

1 cup plain flour
½ cup self raising flour
1Tb caster sugar
90g butter, cubed
1 Tb lemon juice
2-3T cold water

Method Cases

Place flours in food processor.
Add butter and process until mixture resembles fine crumbs.
Add lemon juice and enough water while processing to firm dough.
Turn onto a lightly floured board, knead lightly until smooth.
Flatten to approximately 2cm thick and wrap in glad wrap. Refrigerate for 10 minutes
Using a rolling pin, roll out pastry to cover base of a small pie tins.
Your tarts and now ready to fill!

Ingredients - Filling

1/3 cup cater sugar
1/3 lemon juice
1 cup cream
Rind of one lemon
3 eggs

Method

Whisk together sugar, juice, juice, cream and rind in large bowl.
Beat in eggs, one at a time.
Pour equal amounts into each pastry case.
Bake at 180 degrees for 15-20 minutes until set.

Dear Sir/Madam

We are students at La Salle College and members of the Student Representative Council. We were deeply offended by the contents of A Vaughan's letter in the Echo of Saturday 24 May and the negative manner in which it portrayed our school.

As the writer, A Vaughan, clearly stated, he/she knows very little of our school, only that it is a private college. As we read the letter, we developed an understanding of what the writer was trying to say, but what made us so concerned were the unsubstantiated assumptions that were made and the negative image portrayed towards our school. The writer implied that the College was a second rate school, where students have no respect for anyone around them. We would like to let A Vaughan and the wider community know that this is most untrue. While we cannot deny that there are students who believe the world revolves around them in any school, the overwhelming majority of La Salle students have the utmost respect for their school and the community. It is a shame that the writer encountered a single student of La Salle who is clearly not representative of our student body. It is disappointing that someone can then judge an entire school of 1100 students by this single person's actions.

Many of the staff and students at La Salle have been deeply offended by A Vaughan's letter. The tone of the letter contrasts to the ideals of La Salle. The writer portrays the students at the College as spoilt brats. The majority of our students are extremely proud of their school and would do anything to protect the reputation of their College. As our College song says, "We are LaSallian" and we think it is safe to say that the majority of all La Salle students, past, present (and future), have ensured, throughout their school life that they have represented the College in a positive manner. As we see it, it is most unfair to judge an entire school upon the actions of one person and to use that solitary student's inappropriate actions to make incorrect and quite destructive comments about the College community.

We agree that the writer has every right to be disappointed with the carelessness and disrespect of the student involved. This student's attitude was wrong and an embarrassment to the College. However, we speak on behalf of over one thousand students when we say that reading about how our school produces "toffy nosed" students in the local paper is unfair, unwarranted and simply not accurate. The school community would have greatly appreciated it if A Vaughan had contacted the College personally and made his/her feelings evident instead of so negatively labeling both the school and its students in a public forum.




